#### **COASTAL VIRGINIA**

This is one of the most beautiful and historically rich areas in America. From the time the early 17th century settlers established a colony along the James River, and through-out the Revolutionary and Civil Wars, to the history that continues to be made today, there is something for everyone. It is also worth a trip to Richmond just to enjoy the magnificent Jefferson Hotel and their outstanding cuisine.

#### LEMONS TO LEMONADE – NAVY STYLE

It has been said that life is what occurs while a person is busy making other plans. Proof of this truism occurred on the USS Finch in 1963 when Prestel, SO2, reported to the crew mess deck to tackle his First Class FMT test. Imagine his shock when he opened the envelope and discovered it contained not an FMT test, but a First Class Missileman test! As Prestel reported to his division officer afterward, "the opportunity only comes around every six months, and this was the only test I had, so I took it!" Later both Prestel and his division officer were stunned when his First Class Missileman designation and stripes arrived, approved without comment. Prestel asked his division officer what he should do and was told, "You earned them, so put them on and I will do all I can to get you transferred to a missile frigate before anybody catches on. This is a great unexpected opportunity.

Getting the transfer for Prestel was a typical navy boondoggle. Three attempts were denied for no good reason, except politics. It was obvious the Finch had no need for a Missileman. Finally, the best opportunity to succeed came up, but it required that the division officer really stick his neck out for Prestel. A ship's inspection by the Admiral was scheduled. The Captain called the J.O.'s together and warned them that under no circumstances were any of them to speak to the Admiral. Prestel's division officer thought to himself "Bullshit". He was going to find a way to deliver a message to the Admiral in an attempt to do an end run on Prestel's transfer.

For 50 years he never knew what had became of Prestel - until the 2013 Finch reunion in Memphis. Prestel showed up and had dinner with his old D.O. just to say "Thank you". It turned out that Prestel was involved in a hot new phase of navy gunnery and therefore spent most of his time working out issues on the missile system with the engineers from the manufacturer. They were amazed how intelligent he was and guided him back to college and then into their field in the aerospace industry. Prestel made a career there for several decades before he burned out and retired to commercial retail sales.

This experience clearly points out the value of our Finch reunions. Those of you choosing not to attend are missing a rare opportunity to tell a fellow crewman, "Thanks for having my back, Bud".

If you plan to fly to the reunion, make your flights in and out of Norfolk International Airport. It is located about 10 miles from the hotel. The hotel does not offer airport transportation. know you are with the Finch and they will match you with other arriving shipmates to get a better rate.

If you are driving, the hotel is off I-264 in downtown Norfolk. Use exit 9 for easy access to the hotel located at 777 Waterside Drive. Google Maps has a great map.

## **Finch Sea Tale:** As experienced by Earl Greiner, LTjg (DER-'61)

Do you remember your early introduction to your first ship? My first and last was the Finch. And, remember your first cruise to sea? It was my first picket in Spring of 1961 when I discovered first-hand that a "boot-camp" had better proceed cautiously to avoid stepping on toes.

I had a commanding officer (who it is best left un-named herein) that was a bombastic old sea-dog who had come up through the ranks as a "Mustang". He held a high disdain for we "worthless 90-day wonders" and loved to give us a chance to flaunt our failings at every opportunity, while he provided a running commentary about the weak performance. One afternoon the J.O.s were summoned to the bridge for maneuvering drills. A weather balloon was placed in the water as a target. He established the parameters, which was to circle the balloon and eventually come to a stop with the balloon stationary directly under the whaleboat. I caught it with the starboard bow then juked the power one time and watched it roll down the starboard side. I hit all ahead 1/3 then all-stop with the balloon directly under the whale boat. I was the only J.O. who was able to manage the maneuver. The Captain had a fierce scowl on his face, but I might have been OK if I had just kept my big mouth shut, but you who know me know that rarely happens. So I gave him a big smirk and said: "Like that, Captain?!"

The Captain blew his cork, started swearing like a sailor, and stormed off the bridge. After he left my OOD, Lynn Armel, laughed and said, "Boot-camp you may have won the battle but you aren't going to win the war. Man, did he call it right. Captain was all over my butt until the next boot-camp came aboard and became the new target-of-the-day.

I might add that I was getting mighty pissed about his treatment, so one day during gunnery practice I was on the 03 level handlebar gun director and he was stillgiving me nothing but grief. So I turned the no.1 gun mount directly aft and pointed the cannon right at the bridge. I figured he would get my mesage. He did and once again blew a cork. Of course I said I was sorry. It was just an accident. Riiightt!!!!
